## §19. The Menis



The wrath of Achilles, scion of Peleus, sing, O Goddess, ruinous wrath, that afflicted with numberless woes the Achaeans,

- Iliad 1:1-2

We have suggested that the performance module for the Wrath and its precursor was 50 minutes, plus or minus 10 . We have noted interpolations which, if removed, bring some long books within that range. Here is the picture so far reached. We give the length of each Iliad book, save those we see as later additions (Id 10, 23, and 24), with interpolations so far suggested, and books which we have proposed to divide into two modules (Id 11, 13, and 16). ${ }^{1}$

So far the present investigation. It may be of interest, at this point, to see what effect these changes have on the stylistic similarity of the Iliad books. We have space only for one comparison, Iliad 1-6 as they stand in the text, and as modified by our proposals. Here are the results for the present text: ${ }^{2}$

Two consecutive chapters show High values: Id $1 / 2$ at $\mathrm{D}=0 \cdot 84$, and Id $5 / 6$ at $\mathrm{D}=0.95$, almost prohibitive. The rest are in the Normal range, as might be expected from what ought to be chapters in the same work. Id 1, as the keynote book of the Menis, shows an almost prohibitive value ( $\mathrm{D}=0 \cdot 99$ ) with Id 3 , the first of what we take as recycled Trojan War books. Those books themselves (3/4), again unsurprisingly, are in the Normal range ( $\mathrm{D}=0.65$ ). Our suggestion that 3 and 4 may have been incorporated by Homer from the Trojan repertoire without drastic rewriting is, at least, not refuted by these stylistic results.

And here are the values for Id 1-6 incorporating changes so far suggested:
